

Motorcycle Mechanic Job Description

- Conduct thorough repair work for issues related to motorcycles
- Carry out advanced repair work based on available safety guidelines
- Perform routine maintenance, including replacement of worn-out parts, ignition tuning, and inspection.
- Prepare work orders and estimate costs of repair work to be accomplished on the vehicles
- Replace or repair faulty parts such as engines, transmissions, brakes, and suspension systems
- Carry full motorcycle inspection to confirm that motorcycle are in a condition that is within safety and environmental regulation
- Diagnose using computerized equipment, complex motorcycle defects and determine proper work methods to rectify such defects
- Check, comes up with the proper settings, and calibrate the operation of motorcycle parts for better performance, e.g., carburetors, fuel injection system, and ignition system
- Install whatever part and accessories required to meet customer needs or improve performance as better
- Perform wheel alignments and balance the tires to ensure a smooth and safe ride. Troubleshoot and repair the electrical system; for example, starters, alternators, and battery systems
- Record repairs, maintenance, and parts replacement done on each motorcycle
- Advise customers professionally on matters related to taking care of their motorcycles, indicating when they need to check their motorcycles' condition and looking for ways to improve performance
- Provide customers with an estimation in terms of costs, time, and causes, at the same time clearly explaining the cause of the problem and identifying other potential works that may be required

- Order for parts, tools, and supplies and managing inventory to be used effectively at the workshop
- Clean and detail motorcycles before delivery after repair to the owner. This is good professional presentation to the owner
- Be updated on new motorcycle models, its technologies and repair techniques through continual training and certification
- Being able to collaborate with other mechanics and service officials in the effective balancing of workload for on-time deliverables
- Mentor and train junior mechanics or apprentices; that is, imparting knowledge and best practices
- Provide, whenever necessary, emergency road service; roadside diagnose and fix breakdowns, when feasible.
